

Empowering Local Learners Initiative

All the schools and preschools in Port Augusta and Quorn have been working together for over four years to improve the numeracy and problem solving skills of our students from the early years to secondary. This exciting project involves all the schools and preschools in Port Augusta and Quorn working together and in collaboration with Flinders University to develop highly effective numeracy teaching approaches based on current research and designed to support improved learning outcomes for our students. Achievement data in numeracy is clearly showing significant improvements for students. For our school this shift in numeracy teaching has seen five

consecutive years of improvement in our numeracy results.

The graph shows that students who have been directly involved in this project for the last two years demonstrated over 2.5 years growth in their numeracy development last year alone! This is an impressive result and as the project develops we intend to ensure that all students in our partnership benefit.

Sam started out teaching in the SAASTA program at Port Augusta Secondary School a few years ago as a new teacher taking on more responsibilities. A sign of his potential leadership was a sports carnival that he organised in 2016 for SAASTA schools including Whyalla, Port Pirie, Quorn, Coober Pedy and even Mark Oliphant students. The event ran very smoothly due mainly to Sam's excellent organisational skills and ability to keep everyone informed.

2017 is the first year that Sam was officially made the SAASTA Coordinator and he has excelled in that role. He communicates regularly with Head Office staff keeping us informed of information relevant to the SAASTA students in Port Augusta.

Port Augusta had an extremely successful Aboriginal Power Cup wining 3 awards including the Curriculum Award which the school was very proud of. This indicates that all the curriculum tasks were completed not only on time but to an extremely high standard.

Sam's strength is his passion for the program and the students. He speaks very proudly about SAASTA at school assemblies and delivers the SAASTA message that it's a privilege to be in SAASTA not a right.

Sam expects a lot from his students. Recently I received an email from Sam at 9.30 at night expressing his frustration that a few of his Year 12 students were so close to completion if only they would come to school. The school conducted a Year Graduation assembly before Exams so some of the students believed they didn't have to attend from then on. He clearly wants the best for his students but at times they don't meet his high level of expectation, which is where the frustration sets in.

I'm personally very pleased and proud that Sam Carter is the SAASTA 2017 Coordinator of the Year, Congratulations Mr Carter.

Workabout Centre

New VET courses offered in YES

Two new Vocational Education Training (VET) certificate courses have been introduced in the YES Centre this year. Students can now study Certificate III in Fitness and Certificate II in Kitchen Operations.

Certificate III in Fitness provides a pathway to work as a fitness instructor to deliver exercise sessions for groups, aqua or gym programs in fitness, leisure, aquatic and community centres.

Certificate II in Kitchen Operations provides a pathway to work in kitchens in organisations such as restaurants, hotels, catering operations, clubs, pubs, cafes and coffee shops. It also provides an entry to work within institutions such as aged care facilities, hospitals, prisons and schools.

Creativity has been flowing for students in the HEALs program in the YES Centre this term. Students have been working on several different projects, including making magazine flower topiary trees and dream catchers. A lot of patience and some new skills were learned to create these projects.




Two groups of YES Centre students undertook tours of the Augusta Power Stations site in early March, touring the demolition site and ash storage revegetation zone.

Flinders Power representatives began the tour with a briefing, which gave students an insight into the history and operations of the power station before it ceased generating on May 9, 2016.

The rehabilitation project is almost 80% complete, with completion expected in the second half of 2018. Flinders Power aims to leave the site in a condition suitable for future industrial use, with the possible sale of the land to a suitable buyer.

Demolition work is nearing completion and by conclusion approximately 50,000 tonnes of scrap metal will have been salvaged from the Augusta Power Stations site. Five trucks and semi-trailers have been continually moving scrap



metal daily from the site and transporting it to the wharf at Port Pirie to be loaded on to ships.


Much of the scrap metal has been sold to Vietnam and a shipment of

steel was due to leave Port Pirie on March 14.

Students were surprised by the amount of steel still at the site, the enormity of the structures and the size of the machinery being used for demolition and salvage.

Year 9 student Andrew Scott said the tour was "very interesting", "I was very surprised by the amount of scrap metal that was there and by how long it took them to build and how little time it took to destroy it," Andrew said.

"The best part was being able to get out of the bus and be able to get so close to the demolition work."



In coming months there are several more demolition activities planned, including the charge felling of the Northern Central Coal Bunker in April. The bunker will be processed for scrap metal. The Playford B Baghouse and Boilers will also be removed in April, using giant excavators, and in May the Playford B Turbine

Hall will be mechanically demolished. A huge, purpose-built mechanical arm has been built to assist with demolition.

The final felling event will be the 200m Northern stack, expected in mid-2018. An exact date has not been finalised as approvals are still pending.





During Week 7, Marine Science students participated in a 3 day camp with Mr Everett and Ms Crane in Adelaide and the Fleurieu Peninsula focusing on oceanography and biodiversity.

The camp started with a full afternoon visit to Port Adelaide and the Maritime Museum, with a harbour tour on the ex-police launch the 'Archie'. They discussed the history of the port, along with environmental issues and the impact of heavy industries on the local marine fauna and flora. At the museum students engaged in an iPad investigation and received educational sessions on cetaceans (whales & dolphins).

On day 2 students visited a number of beaches on the Fleurieu Peninsula, including Yankalilla, Waitpinga, Middleton and Goolwa. They observed longshore drift and rip currents, and how the energy of the beach affects the sand composition. They discussed safety strategies in assessing dangerous conditions and what to do in situations of danger. Students also conducted a biodiversity examination of the rock pools at Yankalilla, and compared this with the other beaches.

On Day 3, students participated in a 3 hour kayaking adventure in the Port River estuary, examining the mangroves and gained an understanding of how a polluted waterway can be rehabilitated. For future students that have an interest in the ocean and Earth science, marine science offers you an opportunity to explore and understand the marine environment directly.



Sports Day 2018

On Friday 9 March 2018, Port Augusta Secondary School held its annual Sports Day at Braddock Oval. Students participated throughout the day with determination and sportsmanship despite the warmer conditions. Year 7 students from the local primary schools joined us once again, competing with enthusiasm in the under 13 age group. Spencer started the day in the lead after the 1500m and Javelin events held on Thursday and they maintained that lead the whole day. Wilpena were in close contention earlier in the day but were no match for the athleticism and participation numbers of Spencer, the overall winners on the day.
