

YES Centre Students at the Senior formal

YES CENTRE RSA COURSE

It is a legal requirement for any person serving or supplying alcohol in a licensed premises to have completed their Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) training.

This course is suitable for those currently working in or seeking work in the hospitality industry, in a role that involves the sale and supply of liquor. This may include food and beverage attendants at cafes and restaurants, bottle shop staff, or cellar door staff at wineries, breweries and distilleries.

A group of 20 students completed their Responsible Service of Alcohol (RSA) training on November 5.

During the course the students, mostly from the YES Centre, learned how to sell or serve alcohol responsibly; how to safely manage intoxicated patrons; communication strategies to refuse the supply of alcohol; and the current RSA legislation in South Australia. Successful completion of the course provided students with an industry certificate."

Spinning Wheel

Ms Dyer brought her spinning wheel in to YES last week to show students how to spin wool. Students and teachers watched her demonstrate spinning sheep's fleece into yarn. Some tried their hand and realised there is quite an amount of skill and technique required.
