#### Witchelina Camp, 19 June, 2018

During week 8 of term 2, 11 year 8/9 Aboriginal students travelled to Witchelina Station to take part in 'Heathgate Resources Kids on Country program'. The program provides young Aboriginal students the skills, opportunities, belief and confidence to finish school and successfully move into post school options. The program has been designed to improve the chances of Aboriginal students finishing school while gaining a greater understanding of the resources industry and the wide variety of post school options and pathways that may be available to them. Program activities included fencing, geology and palaeontology sessions, cultural songs and stories around the camp fire with Adnyamathana elders, bird watching, bush walks and property tours. Thanks to Aunty Kathy, Mr Finch, Mr Kildea and Mr Von Senden for making this happen, and well done to all students involved.



#### 8/9 Girls Knockout Soccer, Clare, 27 June, 2018

#### Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding. The NCCD involves the collection of; The number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students, the level of adjustment provided to students. student's type of disability if known.

Under the model, the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions.

If your child is identified for inclusion in the collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.
