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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It is difficult to believe that we are approaching the end of term 3 and our year twelves are busy completing final tasks as they prepare to complete year 12 with many students heading into exams early next term –we wish them well!

Next term looks very busy for our school. As a school we are always trying to improve and as part of our continuous school improvement processes, we will be involved in an external school review with a Department for Education review panel.

The purpose of external school review is to support us to raise achievement, sustain high performance and provide quality assurance. All government schools are externally reviewed every 3 years. Over the last few years our school has shown a significant improvement trend in our senior secondary outcomes including SACE completion, increased grade averages, and training and employment outcomes. While this is something to celebrate we know as a school we can further improve the services we offer and the outcomes we can support our students to achieve.

The focus of the external school review is to evaluate our school's performance. The review panel includes a review officer and a trained review Principal. Our school review will occur early next term. The review panel will identify aspects of our school's improvement that have been verified through the review processes, as well as the improvements that we need to make in the future.

Our school is proud of its ability to offer a wide range of programs for our students and a diverse curriculum linked to a range of learning pathways consistent with our school motto of 'Success for All' and we will continuously look for ways of improving outcomes for all of our students.

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Electronics

This term, some year 8 and 9 students have learned about the holy trinity of electricity. They have applied their conceptual knowledge of current, voltage and resistance to design, model or build and measure a variety of circuits involving LEDs.

LEDs differ from our filament lamps because they are more sensitive to increases in voltage. This means that they can blow up much easier than our high energy filament bulbs, which many of our students find out when their circuits are incorrect. Don't worry about the blowing up. When I say blowing up I just mean they go out and will never work again, as some of our students find out, and maybe more than once.



As a world we've all come a long way in such a short time in our use of LEDs, in preference to those energy sucking filament lamps and our students today need to understand the requirements of these new technologies that have created opportunities for innovation. If you had said 20 years ago that you were going to have coloured lighting in your toilet, everyone would have had a joke at your expense.





However, it is the entrepreneurs and innovators of today who are having the last laugh as they benefit from the sales of millions of useful gadgets.

The skills learnt provide our students with a real world understanding of electricity. Our hope is that it brings inspiration to the innovators of their future to create a better world for everyone.





Outdoor Ed Rock-climbing Self Reliant Camp

On Tuesday August 25, the year 12 outdoor education class went on a three day self-reliant canoeing camp in Remark. The class got an early start to the day leaving school in the early hours of the morning. Students had a lunch break in Remark before arriving at Canoe The Riverland where we were fitted with life jackets and begun the process of packing and waterproofing our canoes for the journey ahead.

Day one was a learning experience for everyone as we went the wrong way and had to proceed to the route we were on as we went too far ahead. The class had to work as a team the whole time to get to the right destinations, there was never a time where we weren't using team work.

For the first night it was an experience no one will forget as one of team members were ill and needed rest. Everyone helped out by taking night shifts and being at his side when he was sick. On Tuesday September 8 the year 11 outdoor education class departed school for their three day rock climbing camp in Adelaide. Students spent their first day at Vertical Reality Indoor Climbing learning about the crucial safety aspects and belaying technique required for rock climbing. They then had the opportunity to put their learning and theory into practice. Students attempted a series of different indoor climbs, varying in difficulty.

Day two brought perfect weather as students prepared themselves physically and mentally for a day of rock climbing at Morialta Conversation Park. The class worked effectively as a group demonstrating strong leadership and skill development. Students were able to push through some mental barriers overcoming some fears and anxiety. A massive congratulations to Luke Magor for persisting and completing the most difficult climb of the day. The students also had a special quest appearance from



a native koala who walked by and perched itself in a close by tree.



At night, students were treated to a night time walk at Cleland National Park where they fed local kangaroos, Tasmania devils and were exposed to the reptile room filled with loads of snakes and creepy crawlies! After packing up on the final morning, students were posed with one last task, Challenge Hill! In groups of three students were required to carry water balloons through the obstacle course without letting them burst. Students demonstrated

great communication skills and problem solving.

Well done to Lenny Hoffman, Harry Bolitho and Jacob Keenan who were the challenge winners and won KFC for lunch as their prize. Overall the class demonstrated sound rock climbing technique. They are now reflecting on their development and preparing for their next expedition camp in term 4.

Next term they will complete confined spaces and working at heights training, as well as how to operate a wheel loader.

TECHNOLOGY TOOLS - Success for All - 2021 One Student, One Device



The Port Augusta Secondary School Governing Council endorsed the Technology Tools initiative which took effect from term 1 2020. They would now like to extend this opportunity of One Student, One Device across all year levels from the commencement of the 2021 school year. Please refer to page 2 which outlines the rationale for this initiative. Available options are detailed below.

YEAR 11 & 12 STUDENTS

All year 11 and 12 students will require their own device. Families can choose from option 1 (BYOD) or option 2 (hire) as detailed below. Families can also apply through our Equity for all Students scheme (see Further Information below).

YEAR 8 – 10 STUDENTS

From term 1, 2021, year 8 to 10 students will have the opportunity to have their own device. Families can choose from option 1 (BYOD) or option 2 (hire) as detailed below. Families can also apply through our Equity for all Students scheme (see Further Information below). Students of families not taking up this opportunity will still have access to school owned devices during lesson times via a booking system.

SPECIALIST PROGRAMS (YES, IPP/SKILL, SAASTA, LEARNING HUB)

School owned devices will be available in specialist program areas dependent on need.

OPTION 1 - BYOD

Bring your own device (BYOD) from home, or purchase a new device through your preferred supplier. To assist families with pricing research please visit the school website http://pass.sa.edu.au (click on Technology Tools – BYOD, then BYOD Parent Portal). When purchasing devices please ensure they meet the minimum specifications as detailed below. Families choosing this option may be eligible for '2020 to 2022 Rebate Scheme'. See below.

OPTION 2 – Hire a school owned device

Pay \$120 hire fee per school calendar year for a device which meets all specifications, enabling 24 hour 7 days per week access.

An instalment plan of \$30 per term is available. Large families may be eligible for reduced hire fees.

Please contact Student Services to discuss.

An agreement form must be completed, prior to hiring a device.

Devices need to be returned by the end of November each year to be checked and updated.

NOTE: Office 365 is available for free to all DFE students.

Instructions on how to access this are on the school's website. Click on 'Technology Tools - BYOD'.

Further Information

Governing Council acknowledge that some families may not be in a position to purchase or hire a device. However we would like to come to an arrangement allowing families to provide the opportunity for their child to have a 1:1 device if they feel this would be beneficial to their learning. Please contact Student Services who can assist you in applying under our Equity for all Students scheme. A form for this is also available on the school website, click on Technology Tools – BYOD. Families may also be eligible for the Australian Government supported No Interest Loan Scheme (NILS). For information go to https://nils.com.au// - type 'Port Augusta' into 'find your nearest provider'.

2020 to 2022 – Rebate Scheme

Families choosing option 1 may be eligible for a rebate from Governing Council of \$25 per term (\$100 per year) credit which can be utilised for payment of school fees, uniforms or excursions. This offer is available for a 3 year period from 2020 to 2022. Therefore if you opt for BYOD from 2020 to 2022, you will be entitled to a total \$300 credit to be spent at the school. Credits will be issued each term. BYOD agreement forms will need to be completed through the Resource Technology Centre (RTC).

To be eligible for the \$100 per year credit, devices must be consistently used at school, sufficiently charged ready for use and meet our recommended minimum specifications:

RATIONALE

AIM

Students to have the opportunity for a 1:1 device (1 student:1 laptop), providing them with appropriate technology supporting their learning and increasing opportunities for successful educational outcomes.

Governing Council have endorsed the Technology Tools initiative to allow all students this opportunity.

BACKGROUND

The government provided funding under a program known as the Digital Education Revolution (DER). This program was introduced to assist secondary schools improve the ratio of devices for students in years 9 to 12. The funding was very much appreciated and helped to increase the availability of technology to our students. When funding was removed the school tried to continue to provide the same level of technology reached through the DER but this was at the detriment to other areas requiring resourcing within the school. This is no longer sustainable.

The introduction of Technology Tools at the beginning of 2020 provided opportunities for more students to access technology. Families choosing the BYOD option are being supported by provision of a rebate. Families choosing to hire a device are giving their children the opportunity of having a 1:1 device 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.

Key benefits

- Increased class/instruction time less class time used in borrowing a device.
- Device is available for the entire school day; students are not restricted by unavailable school devices.
- Improved self-reliance learning to be organised and autonomous.
- > Being able to complete work at home started during a lesson at school.
- > Learning / exposure to / keeping up with, digital skills needed for life.
- Improved hygiene not using shared devices.
- > Allows for more flexibility in the classroom with spontaneous delivery of content.
- Provides opportunity for improvements to the school, eg facilities (indoor/outdoor activity spaces), classroom equipment and furniture.
